The Leaders of Tomorrow Scholarship program is the Lottery's largest education initiative. The program offers a \$4,000 college scholarship paid in \$1,000 annual increments to one graduating senior from every high school in New York State. The scholarship may be applied towards the cost of attendance at any New York accredited college, university, trade school or community college. 
Where do New York Lottery sales go?

New York State Governor George E. Pataki

To date in 2001, the New York Lottery has contributed more than \$20 billion to support education in New York State.

That's \$20 billion in revenue used to support local school districts. That's \$20 billion that was raised and systematically disbursed to communities across the State without impacting local taxes, programs or services. That's \$20 billion produced and contributed by a single entity whose sole mission since its inception has been and continues to be: To raise revenue to

support primary and secondary education in New York State. That's the New York Lottery.

Less than three cents of every dollar earned by the Lottery is expended on administrative costs and less than two cents is spent on contractor fees, making the New York Lottery one of the most cost-effective operations of its kind in the world. Likewise, 54 cents of every dollar is returned to Lottery players in cash prizes and six cents is returned to Lottery retailers as commissions, which last year totaled more than \$250 million.

The Lottery contributes the remaining 35 cents of every dollar spent on a New York Lottery game to the State Aid to Education Fund. Last year alone, revenue from Lottery games totaled more than \$1.4 billion. That \$1.4 billion exceeds the amount New York received in federal aid and is actually more than the amount the State received from other combined sources. No other state-run Lottery has ever succeeded in raising this much revenue for the benefit of a single cause.

We can all be proud of the Lottery's continued record of operational efficiency. Through expert guidance and sound business practices and procedures, I believe the Lottery will continue to succeed in its mission to help enhance the future of New York's most valuable asset, our children.
