ANNUAL REPORT - 1972

Revenue to the State from Thoroughbred racing plummeted \$11,437,585 in 1972 from the 1971 return and track attendance dropped sharply. While these alarming facts have been widely published and the responsibility placed on the doorstep of burgeoning off-track wagering, the Commission believes that a share of the responsibility for the erosion must be allocated to other factors.

Declining revenue and attendance figures from other jurisdictions suggest that the economy has had a definite adverse affect on racing.

Falling attendance and wagering must be attributed, however, in large measure to loss of interest among fans. An ever increasing number of races with short fields which are of little interest to seasoned patrons has served to dampen enthusiasm for the sport. The Commission has repeatedly advocated an increase in the number of stalls at the Metropolitan area tracks - the number available is approximately the same as in 1957 - to accommodate a larger horse population necessary to fill races. Regrettably, the shortages have not been remedied. As smaller fields have appeared in an increasing number of races, the Commission has observed a decline in competition calculated to dilute enthusiasm of fans. The great stables of former years which regularly raced in New York are gradually passing from the scene. Smaller stables controlling many fine horses are emerging in their place. Racing in New York must be made more attractive to the newer owners so they will be encouraged to race here.

Inconvenience and discomfort in attending the races has also contributed to loss of interest. The Commission is particularly aware of an increasing dissatisfaction among patrons with parking facilities. It is desirable that track parking be made much more accessible.

REVENUE TO THE STATE

The revenue to the State from 379 days of racing in 1972 was \$74,149,092, a decrease of 13.36 per cent from the prior year.

The Finger Lakes track is required to pay a minimum of 4.958 per cent. Breeders awards and trophies of \$6,450 and \$1,459 when added to the \$2,223,033 yielded a net underpayment of \$23,960 to be applied to the 1973 season.

^{**} The MYRA is required to pay a minimum of 3.00 per cent of its total on-track pools in purse distributions in addition to a percentage based on off-track vagering. Breeders awards and trophies of \$\infty\$7,542 and \$\infty\$47,233 when added to the combined total of \$\infty\$21,459,500 yielded a net underpayment in purses of \$\infty\$76,523. TRACK FINANCIAL REPORTS - FOR THE 1971 RACING SEASON

NYRA TRACKS

The following is a condensation of NYRA's statement of income for the fiscal year ended February 29, 1972 (for the 1971 racing season).

The operating income for the year was \$1,687,879 as compared to \$50,298 for the prior period. After other income and deductions are included, however, a \$935,405 loss for the year resulted. This suggests that the loss is more appropriately attributable to extraordinary items than operational expenses.

LEGISLATION

For the purpose of affording NYRA an opportunity to stimulate track attendance, the Legislature in 1972 authorized the Commission to approve special promotional admission charges. Following enactment, the Commission approved a number of special admissions which were less than the established charges. In addition, the Legislature authorized the Commission to extend the racing season from Friday, Pecember 15, 1972 to include Saturday, December 16, 1972.

STRIKE OF PARI-MUTUEL CLERKS

On Monday, March 6 racing at Aqueduct was suspended by reason of a strike by Pari-Mutuel Clerks. With the aid of the State Mediation Service, NYRA and the Independent Association of Mutuel Employees reached a settlement on Friday, March 24. Racing resumed on Saturday, March 25.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

The Commission records with grateful appreciation the cooperation of Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller and his executive staff for their close cooperation relative to the activities of the Racing Commission for the 1972 season.

The Commission would be remiss were it not to acknowledge its gratitude to the Honorable Malcolm Wilson, Lieutenant Governor; the Honorable Louis J. Lefkowitz, Attorney General; the Honorable Arthur Levitt, Comptroller; and the Honorable Richard Dunham, Director of the Budget, whose cooperation has made the Commission's task less difficult.

To the Honorable John P. Lomenzo, Secretary of State, and his highly efficient staff, the Commission extends its appreciation for its cooperation and assistance during the year.

THE PRESS

The Commission records with appreciation all Thoroughbred racing coverage in New York during the 1972 season. With newspaper space somewhat curtailed compared to other years, the members of the New York Turf Writers Association have done yeoman work in keeping the race-going public well informed of Thoroughbred racing's continued contribution to the American sports scene.

PRESIDENT APPOINTS CHAIRMAN TO NATIONAL COMMISSION

Commission Chairman Joseph A. Gimma was appointed by President Richard M. Nixon on December 23, 1972 a member of the Commission On The Review Of The National Policy Toward Gambling established by Act of Congress.

The Commission will conduct a comprehensive legal and factual study of gambling in the United States and existing Federal, State, and local policy and practices with respect to legal prohibition and taxation of gambling activities and formulate and propose such changes in those policies and practices as the Commission may deem appropriate.

WILLIAM L. PFEIFFER REAPPOINTED COMMISSIONER

William L. Pfeiffer was reappointed to the State Racing Commission for a term expiring May 1, 1978, by Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller on April 25th. Mr. Pfeiffer was first appointed to the Commission July 30, 1969.

NYRA NAMES NEW PRESIDENT AND SECRETARY

NYRA President Frank M. Basil resigned July 13, having held that office since February 12, 1969. He remains with the Association as executive director of the finance committee. Mr. Basil joined the Greater New York Association, NYRA's predecessor, in 1954.

Upon Mr. Basil's resignation John H. (Jack) Krumpe was named president. Mr. Krumpe, who had been serving as vice president in charge of operations joined NYRA in 1960 starting in the accounting

department. He later served as assistant director and director of mutuel operations and as comptroller.

James P. Heffernan became secretary of NYRA October 14, following the resignation of George J. Fritz.

NEW GENERAL MANAGER AT FINGER LAKES

John O'Keeffe, a veteran of the Thoroughbred industry, became general manager of the Finger Lakes Race Track in February, succeeding Walter Thayer, Jr. Mr. O'Keeffe had served in many capacities at various race tracks since 1945 including public relations director, handicapper, director of admissions, Steward, and as a general manager.

STEWARD CHANGES

The Commission approved the appointment of Patrick W. O'Brien, vice president in charge of racing operations for NYRA, as Steward representing NYRA effective May 1, replacing Mathaniel Hyland, who with Commission approval was designated Steward representing The Jockey Club at NYRA tracks. Calvin S. Rainey, Steward representing The Jockey Club at NYRA tracks since 1956, resigned to accept the position of executive secretary of The Jockey Club.

The Commission approved the appointment by The Jockey Club of John T. Morrissey as a Steward at Finger Lakes replacing Walter J. Mara. Morrissey had been with MYRA since 1961, serving as assistant director of racing under John Kennedy and subsequently as an executive in charge of backstretch facilities at MYRA tracks.

MORNING TELEGRAPH SUSPENDS PUBLICATION

The Morning Telegraph, "America's Oldest Authority on Motion Pictures, Theatre and Turf", suspended publication April 10, 1972 following a strike. Established in 1833, it was New York's official racing authority. Its operations were combined with those of the surviving Daily Racing Form.

BREEDERS BUREAU CHANGES

Alex M. Robb, Director of the Thoroughbred Breeders Service Bureau since its inception in 1962, retired January 31. Upon his retirement the Commission duly adopted the following resolution:

WHEREAS, Alex M. Robb began his association with Thoroughbred horses as the director of the horse interests of Willis Sharpe Kilmer, one of America's leading owners and breeders, was the executive secretary of The Thoroughbred Racing Associations of the United States and subsequently the general manager of Belmont Park, and

WHEREAS, since its inception in 1962, the Thoroughbred Breeders Service Bureau of the New York State Racing Commission, New York breeding, under the direction of Mr. Robb, has forged steadily ahead, the Bureau having become a major factor in the growth and development of breeding in the State of New York and an industry of economic importance, having emerged.

NOW THEREFOR, BE IT RESOLVED, that the New York State Racing Commission expresses its gratitude to Alex M. Robb for his faithful service, wise counsel and experienced guidance and direction throughout the years in which he acted as Director of the Thoroughbred Breeders Service Bureau, and on the occasion of his retirement extends to him its cordial felicitations, together with its best wishes for continued health and happiness.

William H. Welch assumed Directorship of the Thoroughbred Breeders Service Bureau on February 7. He had served as Assistant Director of the Bureau for the preceding five years.

Prior to joining the Bureau, Welch served as an inspector for the Commission, as a placing judge, a patrol judge and as a Steward. Born in Rochester, he is a native of Geneseo.

NEW YORK BREEDING

During 1972 New York-breds displayed their usefulness once again by winning 531 races at 41 of the country's race tracks. Notable among those victories were the winners of the New York Breeders Futurity and Juvenile Fillies Stakes.

The New York Breeders Juvenile Fillies Stake, run in late August, was won by Ges Stable's FLO'S PLEASURE, by WHAT A PLEASURE-TORRIAMA by DANTE. FLO'S PLEASURE was trained by L. S. Barrera and ridden by Angel Santiago. Second in the Fillies Stakes was Mike Magde's ONLY JEZZY followed by Dr. Leon D. Star's MY PFERD LADY and R. J. Miller's MY DAD'S DREAM.

The 10th running of the New York Breeders Futurity in September, was won by Mike Magde's ONLY JET by ONLY ONCE-BABA BITHRA by JET JEWEL.

ONLY JET, bred, trained and owned by Mr. Magde, was ridden by native
Englishman Terry Hickmott. Following ONLY JET across the finish line
was the Juvenile Fillies Stakes winner, FLO'S PLEASURE, Mr. W. C. Faugh,
Jr.'s WELCOME CIRCUS, and Mrs. T. M. Waller's NEPPERHIM in that order.

Again in 1972 two races for New York-breds were carded by the NYRA. The first for maiden two-year-olds was run at Saratoga and won by FLO'S PLEASURE, followed by Saul Nadler's ORIENTAL DANCER, Mrs. Waller's MEPPERHAM and William Heller's COOL CANEEL. The second race, also for maiden two-year-olds, was run at Belmont Park with Saul Madler's ORIENTAL DANCER tasting victory followed by Beau-G Stable's DOCTOR BEAU G., Dr. Star's ALAN GOLDNER and William Heller's NIGHT AUDITOR.

The New York State-Bred Registry is an integral part of the breeding program. Only horses registered with the Registry make their breeders eligible for breeders awards and races exclusively for horses bred in New York. Since 1962, nearly 2,000 (1,963) New York-breds have been registered with the Registry, which is headed by the presidents of New York's two breeding associations and the director of the Thoroughbred Breeders Service Bureau.

The Genesee Valley Breeders Association, whose members are in the 31 vestern counties of the State had another active year. In October 1972, Rear Admiral Hubert W. Chanler was re-elected president, Col. Robert Dygert vice president, and Mrs. Ann Glover, secretary-treasurer. The other members of the directorate are Dr. Joseph C. O'Dea, William J. Maxion, Elizabeth Lowther, Michael J. Magde, W. Carvel Martin, C. Kennedy Burke, Dr. Robert B. Hillman, W. Austin Wadsworth, Andrew Macauley, Charles W. Carson and Mark F. Welch.

The Genesee Valley Breeders Association's 57th Annual Fair, held at Lookover Stallion Station on August 26 and 27 was a great success. With 55 classes, the Breeders Grand Champion was Mrs. William C. Faugh's 2-year-old, BIT OF WELCOME by SURE WELCOME. The Champion Broodmare was Hideaway Farm's DONNA B. GCOD, with Roscommon Farm's SECRET STORM second. Mrs. Betty Eksten's colt foal by *MY PRINCE II won one foal class and the

Chanler Trophy; Hideaway Farm's filly by STAR DUKE won the William C.

Faugh Memorial Trophy and the other foal class. Of the Thoroughbred stallions in service in New York (manners and conditions only) Mrs. Mark

L. Alexander's SIR BUCKUP was the winner, with W. Carvel Martin's SHOT FREE second. Richard W. LaValle's colt by SEE SAG SEW won the open class for yearlings, with W. Carvel Martin's SHOT FREE-STELLA JEAN gelding second.

Ins. Faugh's Grand Champion, BIT OF WELCOME, won the two-year-old open class. The Champion three-year-old was Diane Smith Harmon's DARE M. POP.

The Eastern New York Thoroughbred Breeders Association, representing the 31 eastern counties of the State, again had a fine year. In Movember, at the Annual Meeting, Everett F. Schoenborn was re-elected president, William B. Heller vice president, John P. Taylor secretary and Bertram F. Bongard treasurer. The other members of the Board of Directors are Edward E. Benedict, Ellen Bongard, Chester C. Davis, Dr. D. J. DeLuke, Emil Dolce, Hugh Gillen, William A. Levin, Dr. Elizabeth Lukacs, and Thomas M. Waller.

The Eastern New York Thoroughbred Breeders held their Annual Yearling Show in the beautiful walking ring at Belmont Park. Fifteen colts and fillies turned out on a lovely fall day. The colt class was won by Mrs. Thomas M. Waller's unnamed son of SWOON'S SON-BETHLEHEM by *PRINCEQUILLO, with second going to Hugh T. Gillen, Jr.'s NAVY VALE by HAVY BRASS-CLONEEN VALE by PARNASSUS. The winner of the filly class was Mrs. T. M. Waller's SASABE STAR by ROYAL GALLANT-*HAPPY NIGHT by ALIZIER; second was Mrs. Waller's CLOUDS OF GLORY by ROYAL GALLANT-EAGLE CLOUD by EGOTISTICAL. Championship of the show went to the winner of the colt class and RESERVE CHAMPION was the winner of the filly class.

The December issue of the New York Thoroughbred Breeder was distributed to over 800 breeders. The magazine included the listings of Stallions standing in New York State. An editorial pointing out the importance of the Thoroughbred Breeding industry and its potential for enormous growth in New York State was included.

In 1972 the Thoroughbred Breeders Service Bureau processed hundreds of inquiries on pedigrees, sales, mating, and the breeding and

raising of Thoroughbreds in New York. Director William H. Welch visited farms throughout the State to advise and to encourage breeding in New York. During the year, Mr. Alex M. Robb, former director of the Bureau, continued to help project New York's image through his weekly column - New York Breeding - which appeared in the Racing Form as it has for the past ten years.

NATIONAL MUSEUM OF RACING

The National Museum of Racing at Saratoga Springs was again a major tourist attraction. Housing racing's Hall of Fame and a priceless collection of trophies, paintings and turf memorabilia, in 1972 the museum received paintings and trophies from the estate of Mrs. Muriel Vanderbilt Adams and the entire collection of the late George D. Widener racing trophies.

New members elected to the Board of Trustees at its August, 1972 annual meeting were F. Eugene Dixon, John H. Krumpe and Reginald N. Webster.

HALL OF FAME

Trainer John Merud, jockey Eric Guerin and ROUND TABLE, Horse of the Year in 1957, were installed into the Hall of Fame, in ceremonies conducted by Museum President Gerard S. Smith August 7. Honorees in the "Old Timers" category were trainer John Rogers, jockey Clarence Kummer and steeplechase rider Carroll K. Bassett along with PAN ZARETA, a renowned filly of the 1914 era with 76 wins, 31 seconds and 21 thirds in 151 starts, including races at Jamaica, Aqueduct and Empire City.

PROTECTIVE MEASURES

Integrity of racing continued to be of prime concern to the Commission. In addition to its own investigative staff, the resources of the Thoroughbred Racing Protective Bureau (TRPB), the Pinkerton's New York Racing Security Service and the Finger Lakes Security Agency continued to be utilized.

As in the past liaison was maintained with the FBI, New York City Police Department, Nassau County Police Department, Internal Revenue Service, Immigration and Naturalization Service, the Queens County and Nassau County District Attorney's offices and the New York State Police.

THE WORK OF THE LABORATORY

The laboratory carried out an active testing program throughout 1972. Increased sampling at the Thoroughbred race tracks provided added protection against tampering with favorites.

A total of 14,022 official samples were analyzed for the New York State Racing Commission, 9,993 from Aqueduct, Belmont, and Saratoga race tracks and 4,029 from the Finger Lakes track. An additional 19,676 official samples from five tracks under the supervision of the New York State Harness Racing Commission were tested. Minety-nine samples from the New York State Sire Stakes were analyzed. The total number of official samples analyzed was 33,797. Work from three harness tracks was discontinued in 1972.

Thirteen drug detections, seven from Thoroughbred racing and six from harness racing, were reported. This is a marked increase over positive findings in recent years. The drugs found included 4 reports of phenylbutazone, 2 methocarbamol, 1 methamphetamine, 1 methapyrilene, 1 methapyrilene or pyrilamine, 1 pentazocine, 1 procaine, 1 pyrilamine, and I thiabendazole. Each finding was reported, and appropriate action was taken by the commission concerned. These findings emphasize the necessity of continued vigilance to minimize illegal drugging.

Such vigilance requires that research on new and old drugs continue to be carried out at every opportunity. This has been done, and the laboratory is acquiring new, up-to-date equipment to increase its capability of detecting new drugs and smaller amounts of them because many new drugs are given only in very small doses. In 1972, 377 experimental projects and analyses were performed to investigate both new and old drugs and procedures. A change in the method of saliva analysis to a procedure used generally for drug screening in drug abuse work was initiated this year to enable the laboratory staff to handle peak loads

without the help of temporary personnel. This application was fully successful. Increased sampling of favorites that ran out of the money was accompanied by broader drug coverage because additional tests were run on these samples.

Correspondence with other laboratories and review of chemical literature has been maintained steadily in the course of performing experimental research to swell the laboratory's ever increasing file of analytical data on drugs.

During the past year seminars on new drugs and new instruments were attended by the chief chemist and the associate chemist. Both attended the 26th Annual Meeting of the Association of Official Racing Chemists in San Francisco. The chief chemist attended the Round Table Discussion on Matters Pertaining to Racing at the invitation of The Jockey Club.

The New York Laboratory was visited by racing officials from Canada, Japan, Arkansas, Florida, Illinois, Kentucky, Maryland, Michigan, New York, Ohio, and West Virginia. Two chemists appointed by the Arkansas Racing Commission also visited the laboratory to study methods of analysis.

ACTIVITIES OF THE TESTING ENCLOSURE

During the 232 days of racing at Aqueduct, Belmont and Saratoga, 4,986 saliva samples were collected by the Supervisor of Drug Tests. Of these, 2,088 were from winners, 2,084 from horses which finished second, 98 from horses finishing third, 96 from fourths, and 620 were taken at the request of the Stewards.

Urine samples, totaling 4,991 in number, were collected by Commission Inspectors. Of these, 2,089 were from winners, 2,084 from horses which finished second, 98 from horses finishing third, 96 from fourths, and 624 were taken at the request of the Stewards.

During the 147 days of racing at Finger Lakes, 2,677 saliva samples were collected. Of these, 1,330 were from winners and 1,327 from horses finishing second, and 20 were taken at the request of the Stewards. Urine samples totaling 1,352 were collected. Of these, 1,330 were from winners and 22 were taken at the request of the Stewards.

THE SARATOGA SALES

The 52nd Annual Yearling Sales were conducted by Fasig-Tipton Company, Inc. at Finney Pavillion August 8-11. A total of 210 yearlings were sold for \$6,075,300, averaging \$28,930 per yearling. This is slightly under the record set in 1971 when 224 yearlings sold for \$6,841,100, an average of \$30,541.

Highlights of the auction were the sale of a *FORLI filly consigned by Taylor's Purchase and sold to E. P. Taylor for \$140,000 and the sale of a PRINCE JOHN colt for \$106,000 by Mereworth Farm to the Cromwell Bloodstock Agency.

HORSES OF RACING AGE

Five horses-of-racing-age sales were held in New York during the year. Four were held at Belmont Fark and one at Satatoga. They grossed \$4,709,800 for 341 horses, an average of \$13,812.

DISPERSALS

A major dispersal sale was that of the Estate of A. B. Hancock, Jr., held November 20 at Belmont Park. A record \$2,580,000 was paid for 35 horses, averaging \$73,714. The previous mark was set in 1969 at Belmont Park when 57 horses of Cain Hoy Stables owned by the late Harry F. Guggenheim grossed \$1,779,000, an average of \$31,210. The highest price paid for a 1972 yearling was a Hancock, ROUND TABLE—GAMELY colt, sold to the British Bloodstock Agency, Ireland, for \$240,000. Eight of the Hancock consignment sold for over \$100,000.

Other dispersal sales were by Forest E. Hars and the Estate of Michael Schneider. Reduction sales were made by Gedney Farm, Gragwood, C. V. Whitney, Ada L. Rice and Rokeby Stables.

TOTAL SALES

The Yearling Sales, the dispersals and the five horses-of-racing-age sales conducted in 1972 grossed \$10,825,100 for 552 Thoroughbreds sold, averaging \$19,611. This is the highest sales total registered by Fasig-Tipton in New York. In 1971, the totals were \$9,406,300 for 561 horses sold.

HORSES RACED (Aqueduct, Belmont and Saratoga)

In compiling facts and figures for its Annual Report, the Commission records the racing performance of each horse which competed. The name of the horse, its owner, trainer and the jockey who had the mount in each contest are listed. At the season's end, these records furnish the purse award data for the report. The statistics reveal the following items of interest:

- (1) The number of individual horses raced during the 1972 season totaled 3,118, of which 70 were horses entered in jumping events.
- (2) In the 232 days of racing, there were 2,087 races with a total of 18,368 starters.

WINNING FAVORITES

A total of 619, or thirty per cent of the public choices, won in 2,070 races on the flat at Aqueduct, Belmont and Saratoga. The highest percentage of winning favorites was attained at the Aqueduct Summer Meeting where 106 favorites won in 315 races, an average of 34 per cent.

There were 17 jumping races at Saratoga, and in these events 3 favorites won, an average of 18 per cent.

At Finger Lakes, a total of 454 favorites won in 1,326 races, 34 per cent. The highest mark was reached at the Fall Meeting where 158 favorites won in 451 races, an average of 35 per cent.

APPRENTICE JOCKEYS

There were 44 licensed apprentice jockeys riding on NYRA and Finger Lakes race courses. Of the 33 apprentices licensed at NYRA tracks 12 reached the winners circle. Of the 11 racing at Finger Lakes six scored victories.

Thomas Wallis, born in Levittown, New York 18 years ago, had an outstanding year bringing home 98 winners in 551 starts. He was voted the Eclipse Award as America's top apprentice jockey. John Mallano, born in Astoria, Queens, had an outstanding season with 80 wins in 754 starts.

Other leading apprentices seen under colors were Paul Feliciano with 32 wins and Angel Gonzalez, Jr. with 26 victories.

At Finger Lakes Michele Harris led the victory parade with 34 wins in 338 starts, followed by Tim Rosier with 29 and Timothy McEvoy with 10.

STEEPLECHASE RACING

There were 17 races through the field in which 139 entries competed for purses totaling \$142,900. All races were at Saratoga.

HORSE OF THE YEAR - ECLIPSE AWARDS

Meadow Stable's two-year-old colt, SECRETARIAT, was the 1972 Horse of the Year as selected by the combined voting of the TRA's Board of Selection, the staff of the Daily Racing Form and the National Turf Writers Association.

In nine starts the Lucien Laurin trained chestnut son of BOLD RUIER out of SOMETHINGROYAL, won seven and was disqualified from first in the Champagne. Owned by Mrs. John Tweedy, SECRETARIAT earned \$456,404, of which \$193,810 was gained on New York tracks. He won the Sanford and the Hopeful at Saratoga and the Futurity at Belmont. He was also selected Best 2-Year-Old-Colt or Gelding Champion.

LA PREVOYANTE, a 2-year-old filly, unbeaten in all 12 starts was a close second for Horse of the Year and was unanimous choice as 2-Year-Old Filly Champion.

The 3-Year-Old Champion Colt or Gelding is Rokeby Stables' KEY TO THE MINT, edging out RIVA RIDGE, the Kentucky Derby and Belmont winner. SUSAN'S GIRL, running for Fred W. Hooper, was named the top 3-Year-Old Filly.

Other divisional champions, most of whom campaigned on the New York tracks were: Best Colt, Horse or Gelding (& and up), AUTOBIOGRAPHY; Best Filly or Mare (& and up), TYPECAST; Best Sprinter, CHOU CROUTE; Best Turf Horse, COUGAR II; Best Steeplechase or Hurdle Horse, SOOTHSAYER.

"Eclipse Awards" go to all the Thoroughbred Champions along with those voted tops in their field for the year. Vinners for 1972 were: Lucien Laurin, trainer; Braulio Baeza, jockey; Thomas Wallis, apprentice jockey; John W. Galbreath, racing's Man-of-the-Year; the late Christopher T. Chenery, owner; the late Arthur B. Hancock, special award; Milton and Tony Verna (Columbia Broadcasting System), television; Phil Ranallo (Buffalo Courier-Express), news story; Edward L. Bowen (Blood-Horse), magazine; Bob Coglianese (NYRA), photographer; and Joe Burnham (Film award).

CAMONERO II RETIRES

CANONERO II, 1971 winner of the Kentucky Derby and the Preakness, was officially honored and retired November 11 at Aqueduct. Alfred G. Venderbilt, HYRA chairman, presented a plaque which will be placed outside the colt's stall at Gainesway Farm in Lexington, Kentucky. It reads: "The magic of his name and deeds drew 62,694 fans in the Belmont Stakes on June 5, 1971, the largest racing crowd in the history of New York racing". Accepting the award was Buddy Hirsch, trainer for Robert Kleberg Jr.'s King Ranch.

In 1972, CANOMERO's biggest race was at Belmont Park on September 20 when he equaled the American record for a mile and an eighth in 1:56 1/5 under his regular rider, Gustavo Avila of Venezuela, while winning the Stymie Handicap.

THE CLAIMING BOX

JOHN F. KENNEDY: John F. Kennedy, Executive Secretary of The Jockey Club, died July 14 at St. Francis Hospital on Long Island after a long illness. Mr. Kennedy was 58 years of age. Jack, as he was known to his intimates, was born and raised in the shadow of the Saratoga Race Course. He served as Executive Assistant to the late Marshall Cassidy whom he succeeded as Jockey Club Secretary upon the latter's retirement in 1954.

WALTER D. FLETCHER: Walter D. Fletcher, a Trustee of NYRA, member of The Jockey Club and distinguished senior partner in the law firm of Davis, Polk and Wardwell died September 20, in Virginia at the age of 76. Thoroughbred racing and breeding was an avocation of hr. Fletcher's. He raced under the nom de course of the Hovember Hill Farm. He is survived by his widow, hrs. Eleanor Langley Fletcher, daughter of the late William

C. Langley, a former member of the New York State Rading Commission.

A. B. HANCOCK, JR.: A. B. (Bull) Honcock, Jr., a member of The Jockey Club, died at age 62 on September 14. An internationally famous breeder, Hancock operated Claiborne Farm, founded by his father in 1910. Clairborne produced a bevy of Thoroughbred greats which were seen on many occasions under colors on the New York race courses.

WILLIE KNAPP: Willie Knapp, one of America's great jockeys, enshrined in Thoroughbred racing's Hall of Fame succumbed to injuries received in an automobile accident near Belmont Park September 26. In. Knapp, who was 8% years of age at the time of his death, was a regular at New York race tracks. Perhaps his chief claim to turf immortality came at Saratoga in august of 1919 when, in the Sanford Stakes, he dealt the mighty MAN of WAR his only defeat abourd Harry Payne Whitney's appropriately named UPSET. He was also associated with the late Willis Sharp Kilmer's EXTERMINATOR and guided this gallant campaigner to victory in the 1918 renewal of the

Kentucky Derby. In later years Willie Knapp turned to training, concluding his career as an official on the New York racing circuit.

The Commission records with sorrow the passing of John H. Viox on September 12 at age 71. In. Viox was appointed to the Commission in 1943 as an Inspector, became Racing Assistant and was Assistant Secretary and Executive Office Manager at the time of his retirement in 1970. At the Annual Convention of The Mational Association of State Racing Commissioners in Florida the following resolution was passed:


