## <u>The Idea</u>

Across the verdant green hills of the Hudson Valley and just over an hour away from New York City belongs the future site of Resorts World Hudson Valley. As patrons cross New York's longest bridge, the Tappan Zee, it is as if they transit back to a time of country estates rooted in European pedigree – a time when simple farms grew into enclaves and patriarchs of our country decorated their estates with decidedly Asian art and artifact.

Located on a gently rolling site, the resort is surrounded by a unique mix of wetlands, abandoned farm fields, and woods.
